We continue to communicate with our community about the possibility of a funding proposal on a 2024 ballot in order to address the District's most pressing needs. If you have not had a chance to attend one of the meetings at our schools over the past several weeks, we have two more upcoming opportunities to engage with us about this topic on **Thursday, October 12**:

Residents should also have received a mail survey about the funding proposal. Please take a few moments to complete and return it, as your feedback will assist our Board of Education in making a decision about whether or not to move forward with a funding proposal, along with the content and timing of such a potential proposal.

One of the needs that could be addressed by the funding proposal is the update of student service spaces. This means that the district would

reconfigure existing spaces that are used for special education, multilingual education, and other interventions and therapies in order to best meet the needs of our students. Currently, such programs are often held in spaces that were not designed for their specialized functions, causing crowding and distraction for students. 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WORLD EVENTS

It is likely some of our students are following the conflict in Israel as it continues to escalate. They may have an awareness via media sources, and/or are overhearing conversations at home or school. They may be wondering about the cause and the impact the conflict may have on themselves and others. We have gathered resources to support you in helping your children process these events. Below you will find resources for parents/guardians on how to support your child at home.

Many of our students need the guidance and safety of adults in their homes to navigate their own emotions and trauma in a healthy, safe, and productive way. A few reminders when speaking with your child:

- News like this can be scary to children if not handled carefully. Support and conversations will look and sound different with different age groups
- Remain calm
- Affirm that it is okay to feel upset
- Stick to facts from vetted sources
- · Keep explanations developmentally appropriate
- Model coping strategies
- Keep open lines of communication between school and home

Each of these resources provides tips for families and educators, and some include what we can do as adults and how you can respond to students.

NEW SCIENCE MATERIALS

Last spring, the Board of Education approved our new science curricular resource for our students. We adopted Twig Science for grades K-8. This resource provides the opportunity for our students to engage in hands-on, inquiry-based learning during their science instruction.

Twig is aligned to the three dimensions of science learning of Next Generation Science Standards (NGSS). The three dimensions are:

- Cross-cutting concepts (students explore connections across 4 domains of science)
- Science & engineering practices (what scientists do to investigate the natural world and what engineers do to design and build systems)
- Disciplinary core ideas (key ideas in science that have broad importance within or across multiple science or engineering disciplines)

Twig also includes scientific literacy, STEM enrichment activities and multilingual supports built into the resource. This program asks that students assume the role of a scientist as they are engaged from the first lesson in phenomenon-based, hands-on science experiences.
