Mrs. Jessica Albert expressed her thanks and appreciation of Mrs. Tamika Nash for her inspiration and support for the MLK Day of Service at the Grayslake Public Library.

Mrs. Tamika Nash expressed her heartfelt gratitude for the invaluable partnership during the MLK Day of Service. The commitment to fostering a spirit of community engagement contributed significantly to the success of the event. She truly appreciates the library's dedication to honoring Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.'s legacy through service and education. Additionally, Mrs. Nash thanked the 8th grade administration and the D127 administration for their collaboration in hosting open houses for incoming freshmen. They provided a welcoming and informative environment for students and their families. Also, today is International Education Day, a day dedicated to promoting the power of education.

Mrs. Miller provided information about the implementation of Carbon Capture Technology in District 127. This technology actively removes carbon from the air and transforms it into pearl ash, a substance that can be further converted into soap. Additionally, she announced two upcoming professional development opportunities:

## Superintendent Report

Dr. Lynn Glickman shared the following updates:

- Dr. Glickman introduced Mr. Chuck Klaus from the Grayslake Historical Society and expressed her gratitude for the commemorative community plaque highlighting the history of the school district. This plaque has found its place near Grayslake Middle School, serving as a lasting tribute to the district's legacy
- Dr. Glickman extended her sincere thanks to Mrs. Nash and Mrs. Albert for their dedicated efforts in organizing the MLK Day of Service at the Grayslake Public Library
- On behalf of the entire district, Dr. Glickman expressed heartfelt condolences to the Hauck family and Hernandez Family
- Dr. Glickman delivered a comprehensive presentation outlining the journey from Grayslake Middle School to Grayslake Middle School East. This began with the bitterly cold temperatures and challenging wind chills, and extensive damages at Grayslake Middle School. In the face of this unexpected hurdle, the district swiftly pivoted its focus towards securing a suitable location capable of accommodating more than 630 students and staff for an extended period of time. This encompassed providing essential services such as education, food, transportation, and technology. A small team was assembled to assess the feasibility of the University Center, determining whether it could meet the needs of our students. Upon the decision to proceed with the University Center of Lake County, Grayslake Middle School East became a reality. The preparations for the opening of GMS East

unfolded through rigorous planning and the hosting of two open houses for both families and students. The culmination of this process occurred on January 23rd, as students were warmly welcomed to GMS East. The successful transition from one building to another was not merely a logistical feat; it was a testament to the power of collaboration, problem-solving, and community support.

- On January 30th and 31st, a unique educational opportunity awaits the 7th and 8th-grade students. Due to a pre-existing commitment at the University Center and the unavailability of space for part of the day, these days have been designated as half-day field trips. During this time, students will have the chance to explore and gain insights into different educational environments, the Lake County Tech Campus and the College of Lake County Campus.
- Dr. Glickman went on to share the additional challenges that arose in the schools during the severe cold temperatures.

### **Unfinished Business**

This tool has been designed to provide a convenient and user-friendly means for individuals to estimate the potential impact the ballot initiative may have on their taxes.

### New Business

**3 Year Priority Capital Update-** Upon a thorough review of the initially allocated funds, it has been identified that certain projects were primarily intended to cover standard maintenance work. In light of this, the administration believes that these projects can be deprioritized, thus enabling the allocation of resources for the implementation of Priority B items outlined in the 10-Year Health/Life Safety Report.

Here are the key changes to the 3-Year Priority Capital Plan:

- NEW: 10 Year Health Life Safety Survey Allocation:
  - \$1.1 million for Priority B Projects
- Meadowview Carpet
  - Status Change: No longer a Year 3 priority based on available funding
  - Revised Plan: Will be evaluated in Years 4-10
