Registration for 24-25 School Year Now Open!

Registration for current CCSD 46 students and siblings starting school next year is now open. Parents/Guardians can complete an Online Registration application in the Infinite Campus Parent Portal by clicking More in the left menu, then Online Registration, and selecting 24-25 Existing Student Registration.

New students (e.g., Kindergarteners) can be added to the Existing Student Registration application. Pre-K students must complete the Early Childhood Screening and qualify for one of the early childhood programs PRIOR to completing the registration application. For more information regarding the Early Childhood program, please contact Sue Hobson at (847) 543-6204. After completing the Online Registration application, the 2024-2025 registration fees can be paid online by clicking on Fees in the left menu. Early bird pricing is in effect until May 31!

Please remember that for registration to be complete for the upcoming school year, in addition to the payment of registration fees, the Online Registration application must be submitted and approved. Schedules and transportation assignments will not be released in August until registration is complete.

SOLAR ECLIPSE ON APRIL 8



We are excited about an astronomical event that will be occurring on Monday, April 8th: a solar eclipse. This rare occurrence presents a valuable learning opportunity for our students, and we are committed to ensuring their safety while also providing an educational experience. In Grayslake, the moon will cover about 91.5 percent of the sun at the peak of the eclipse, according to a NASA map that is searchable by ZIP code.

Here are the details:


• Partial eclipse begins: 12:51 p.m.

Totality begins: 1:32 p.m.

• Maximum: 2:06 p.m.

• Totality ends: 2:40 p.m.

• Partial ends: 3:21 p.m.



We will be discussing the importance of safety regarding viewing the eclipse with the students, and ask that you do the same at home. Looking directly at the sun, even during an eclipse, can cause serious eye damage or even blindness. Therefore, it is essential that students never attempt to view the eclipse without proper eye protection (which we will be providing). We kindly ask for your cooperation in reinforcing these safety measures at home and ensuring

that your child understands the risks associated with looking at the sun without proper protection.

Here are the safety precautions that we will take:

- We have purchased protective eyewear for all students and staff
- Weather-permitting, we will bring classes outside for a brief period to view the eclipse. We will increase the number of adults assigned to each class for enhanced supervision during this time. Any parents/guardians who do not want their children viewing the eclipse can "Opt Out" by emailing the building principal
- Students and staff will be required to wear the protective eyewear during dismissal
- For the safety of students and staff, any recess or PE classes that take place around the time of the eclipse will be held indoors
- Some students may require accommodations or adaptations due to developmental or other needs to ensure safety. Teachers will consider a variety of accommodations including, but not limited to, providing a social story, practicing wearing glasses for tolerance or other sensory/emotional concerns, utilizing a brimmed hat to shield the sun, alternative aligned activity indoors and/or other individualized considerations. Please reach out to your child's teacher to discuss specific accommodations that you may feel are necessary

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
SOLAR ECLIPSE ON APRIL 8 (CONTINUED)



Some families may want to view the event after school hours, dependent upon family and school dismissal schedules. Children will be arriving home with protective eyewear. If families are interested in procuring additional protective eyewear, we are aware that the Grayslake Area Public Library is distributing "eclipse glasses" at the library's front desk, while supplies last. Finally, we are glad to share that we are working with Astronomers Without Borders to collect and recycle used eclipse glasses after the April 8 event. Astronomers Without Borders sends eclipse glasses to students in Africa, Asia, and South America so they can safely experience a solar eclipse as well. HEALTH INFORMATION: MEASLES

In March 2024, the Chicago Department of Public Health identified several cases of measles in Chicago. In the weeks that followed, the numbers have increased and now include cases in the surrounding areas, including one in Lake County. While we do not have any cases of measles in our schools, we are providing information from the CDC and Lake County Health Department as a service to our community.

TOP 4 THINGS PARENTS NEED TO KNOW ABOUT MEASLES

Measles is very contagious and can be serious. An unvaccinated child can get measles when traveling abroad or even in the U.S. Two doses of MMR vaccine provide the best protection against measles for your child.

1. Measles can be serious.

Some people think of measles as just a little rash and fever that clears up in a few days, but measles can cause serious <u>health complications</u>, especially in children younger than 5 years of age. There is no way to tell in advance the severity of the symptoms your child will experience.

- About 1 in 5 people in the U.S. who get measles will be hospitalized
- 1 out of every 1,000 people with measles will develop brain swelling, which could lead to brain damage
- 1 to 3 out of 1,000 people with measles will die, even with the best care

Some of the more common measles symptoms include:

- high fever (may spike to more than 104° F),
- · cough,
- runny nose (coryza),
- red, watery eyes (conjunctivitis), and
- · rash (3-5 days after symptoms begin).

2. Measles is very contagious.

Measles spreads through the air when an infected person coughs or sneezes. It is so contagious that if one person has it, up to 9 out of 10 people around him or her will also become infected if they are not protected. Your child can get measles just by being in a room where a person with measles has been, even up to two hours after that person has left. An infected person can spread measles to others even before knowing he/she has the disease—from four days before developing the measles rash through four days afterward.

3. Your child can still get measles in the United States.

Measles was declared eliminated from the U.S. in 2000 thanks to a highly effective vaccination program. Eliminated means that the disease is no longer constantly present in this country. However, measles is still common in many parts of the world.

Even if your family does not travel internationally, you could come into contact with measles anywhere in your community. Every year, measles is brought into the United States by unvaccinated travelers (mostly Americans and sometimes foreign visitors) who get measles while they are in other countries. Anyone who is not protected against measles is at risk.

4. You have the power to protect your child against measles with a safe and effective vaccine.

The best protection against measles is measles-mumpsrubella (MMR) vaccine. MMR vaccine provides long-lasting protection against all strains of measles.

Your child needs two doses of MMR vaccine for best protection:

- The first dose at 12 through 15 months of age
- The second dose at 4 through 6 years of age

If your family is traveling overseas, the vaccine recommendations are a little different:

- If your baby is 6 through 11 months old, he or she should receive 1 dose of MMR vaccine before leaving.
- If your child is 12 months of age or older, he or she will need 2 doses of MMR vaccine (separated by at least 28 days) before departure.

Another vaccine, the measles-mumps-rubella-varicella (MMRV) vaccine, which protects against 4 diseases, is also available to children 12 months through 12 years of age.

Measles Can Be Serious



About 1 out of 4 people who get measles will be hospitalized.



MEASLES SYMPTOMS TYPICALLY INCLUDE

1 out of every 1,000 people with measles will develop brain swelling due to infection (encephalitis), which may lead to brain damage.



1 or 2 out of 1,000 people with measles will die, even with the best care.



You have the power to protect your child.

Provide your children with **safe** and **long-lasting protection** against measles by making sure they get the **measles-mumps-rubella (MMR) vaccine** according to CDC's recommended immunization schedule.




