## 2025-2026 School Year Registration Now Open!

Online Registration for the 2025-2026 school year is now open! CCSD 46 offers a \$25 Early Bird discount for families that complete the online application and submit payment before June 3rd, the last day of school.

Please remember that for registration to be complete for the upcoming school year the Online Registration application must be submitted with necessary supporting documents and payment or a payment plan must be received. Schedules and transportation assignments will not be released in August until registration is complete.

Pre-K students must complete the Early Childhood Screening and qualify for one of the early childhood programs PRIOR to completing

If a child in your family has currently or previously been enrolled in any CCSD 46 school, you can access registration through your Infinite Campus <u>parent portal</u>. If you do not have an account or have forgotten your password, please contact your child's school.

Online registration is completed as a family. If you are enrolling new students from your family or your student is moving buildings, they are still considered continuing students, and all students in the family are completed through the same application.



### **DESIGN PROCESS UPDATE: Media Centers**

Wold Architects and Engineers, the district's Architect of Record, presented a Design Process Update at the January 29 Board of Education Meeting. Mr. Matt Verdun of Wold Architects explained the next steps in the planning process to modernize all of the CCSD 46 school media centers which is scheduled to begin in the summer of 2026. This revitalization of our media centers will create enhanced learning environments for all CCSD 46 students. As the Core Planning process has been completed, User Group meetings will begin shortly in each school to lay out the details for each area's reconfiguration. There will be 2-3 rounds of meetings with specific stakeholders, including each school's principal. Using detailed drawings and renderings, Wold will assist each group in detailing the special needs required for each space using the basic "kit of parts" already determined during the Core Planning process.



Based on the design criteria from the Core Planning Group, Mr. Verdun presented the basic layouts of the reconfigured Media/Library spaces, which will now accommodate that "kit of parts", including library stacks, work areas, story areas, large group work areas, and maker spaces in the K-4 buildings, with additional STEM areas at Frederick, Park Campus, and Grayslake Middle School. Mr. Verdun also shared the estimated project cost for each building's construction and furniture, fixtures, and equipment.

Costs of the project are being split between summer construction in 2026, and summer construction in 2027, utilizing funding secured through the successful 2024 Maintaining Excellence referendum campaign. Also included in the summer 2026 budget are building and safety improvements which were highlighted in the referendum campaign - security camera improvements, intercom/clock replacement, access control improvements, emergency management system, as well as exterior building maintenance and repair.

Since the November 2024 Wold update, Mr. Verdun shared that based upon the scope of the project and age of several of the schools, it is recommended to spread the project over two summers to accommodate any remediation needed at the buildings. Reflecting this schedule, and as has been previously shared with the community, the school calendar for 2025-2026 will be modified to start a week earlier than usual, meaning school will end in May of 2026 (unless emergency days are used). This modification will allow for an extra week of construction work in the summer of 2026. The 2026-2027 school year will begin and end as usual. The 2027-2028 school will start a week later than usual, again to accommodate an extra week for construction work in the summer of 2027.

These calendar changes were thoughtfully designed to balance the district's construction goals, instructional and professional development needs, and the convenience of families. ### **HEALTHY REMINDERS**

The winter season can be a time when there is an uptick in illnesses resulting in the need for rest, time away from school, work, or other activities, and/or the need to seek care from a medical provider. There are several notable factors that are associated with this increase including but not limited to: variance in temperatures, being indoors, and activities or interactions in close proximity of others.

Many viruses and illnesses are spread to people by coughing and sneezing or by people touching surfaces contaminated with a virus and then touching their face with unwashed hands. It is important to remember strategies that keep children, staff, and their families healthy as we continue to experience mild to colder temperatures.

- Wash your hands frequently with soap and water for at least 20 seconds or use alcohol-based hand sanitizer.
- Stay home when sick until the fever is gone for 24 hours (without use of fever reducing medications) and until symptoms have improved.
- Cover your coughs and sneezes with a tissue or your upper shirt sleeve and dispose of tissues properly.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth with unwashed hands.
- Avoid close contact, including shaking hands or sharing items such as utensils or cups.
- Clean and disinfect frequently touched surfaces using appropriate EPA-approved products. Follow the manufacturer's instructions on the correct contact time.
- Avoid contact with sick people, especially if interacting with others that may be susceptible
  due to existing medical conditions or that may be especially vulnerable to contracting
  contagious illnesses.
- If you or your family members are experiencing symptoms of more serious illnesses or those requiring medical treatment, please seek a medical provider for care.

CCSD 46 Board of Education Meeting Review is a brief summary of events and topics of discussion that occur at general board meetings.

**GENERAL MEETING: January 29, 2025** 

The CCSD 46 Board of Education held a general meeting on Wednesday, January 29, 2025, in the Falcon Room of Frederick School.

President Stephen Mack called the meeting to order at 6:00 pm. Following the Pledge of Allegiance and the approval of the agenda, visitors to the meeting are invited to address the board for the first of two public comment opportunities. No comments were made.

Wold Architects, the Architect of Record for CCSD 46, presented on the Long Range Facilities Plan and Media Center Updates. Mr. Matt Verdun of Wold Architects presented the next steps for updating the media centers, including a user group process to gather input on the design development. He also provided a cost breakdown for each school and shared the timeline, with construction scheduled to begin in the summer of 2026.

Board reports were presented, as well as the Superintendent's report. During the Board reports, Dr. Mack reminded the Board that the IASB Lake Division Dinner will take place on March 12th. He then addressed the national news, sharing a Board statement emphasizing the critical importance of ensuring all children have access to education. Dr. Mack affirmed the Board's support for the guidance and information Superintendent Dr. Lynn Glickman provided on student rights and privacy. He also expressed deep concern about the potential cuts to education funding that could strip resources

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from grant programs benefiting students and families. The Board reaffirmed its commitment to accessible education for all learners in a safe, empowering, and compassionate environment for students, staff, and families. They remain dedicated to the Diversity and Equity Policy and the compassionate treatment of all individuals, emphasizing that every student has the right and opportunity to learn.

Mr. Jim Weidman updated the Board on the finance committee meeting which took place prior to the Board of Education general meeting.

Mrs. Kristy Miller thanked Dr. Mack for drafting the message on behalf of the Board. She shared that the Community Engagement Committee is finalizing its professional development and planning a spring food drive. Additionally, the Sustainability Task Force will hold its first meeting on February 26, ahead of the Board meeting.

Board Vice President, Mrs. Kristy Braden, updated the Board on the special meeting held on January 23 to interview search firms which will be tasked with finding the next Superintendent for CCSD 46 following the retirement of Dr. Lynn Glickman in June of 2026. The Board is awaiting additional information from two firms to assist in their decision-making. She also attended the ED-RED Legislative Dinner, where keynote speaker Noelle Ellerson Ng, Associate Executive Director of Advocacy and Governance at AASA, discussed the efforts to secure full funding for IDEA.

Dr. Lynn Glickman, Superintendent, thanked Dr. Mack for his statement. She shared that the first E-Learning Day went smoothly. The community supported the day and children had a great day of learning. She also provided an update on Monday's Equity and Inclusion meeting, where participants discussed their book study and addressed concerns and fears within the immigrant community.



Dr. Heather Lorenzo, Director of Student Services, provided an update on Care Solace, the district's mental health referral provider that facilitates access to care for students, staff, and families. She highlighted two pathways for support: anonymous referrals and district-initiated referrals. Additionally, she announced that two district social workers, Ashley Hennenfent (Frederick School) and Grant Chapman (Grayslake Middle School), have been recognized as "Super Care Heroes" for their referrals to Care Solace.

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Ms. Amanda Pelsor, Director of Innovation, announced that registration for the 2025-2026 school year opened last week. She emphasized that early registration supports staffing and planning efforts and reminded families that the "early bird" discount is available until the last day of this school year.

Mr. Chris Wildman, Assistant Superintendent of Finance, provided an overview of federal funding, its impact on the district, and the potential consequences of a pause in federal funding.

President Mack then requested a motion for the approval of the Consent Agenda, which includes Minutes from previous meetings, the Personnel Report, Exception Report, Accounts Payable Report, and Treasurer's Report. The motion carried.

**Action Items** voted on by the Board for this meeting included:
