Multilingual Professional Development Team
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Participation:
 Non-native Spanish speakers who wish to join will enter a lottery for available spots Native Spanish speakers, identified through the district's screening process, will be automatically placed into the program if they choose to participate and demonstrate the necessary language skills
 Grade Level Implementation: The program will launch with Kindergarten in the 2026–2027 school year During the 2026-2027 school year, students in grades 1-8 will continue with the one teacher, one-way dual language program It will expand to 1st grade in 2027–2028 and continue to roll up by one grade level each year through 5th grade. Once students reach 6th grade, they will participate in a Spanish Heritage course instead of the English social studies class This course will include all of the same social studies content, taught in Spanish, along with additional heritage-based curriculum Further course design decisions will be finalized as the program expands into the middle grades
 Make up of classes: Each class will be made up of both native and non-native Spanish speakers Students will receive either Spanish or English instruction in the first half of their day and then swap to be taught for the second half of their day in the opposite language by a different teacher Parents and students must commit to staying in the program at least until 5th grade, with the intent to stay through 8th grade to ensure long-term success
 What does the district need to support this: Provide professional development to support English and Spanish teacher pairs Build a schedule to support students' split days Create family information nights and promotion Develop a lottery system in case we have too many non-native Spanish speakers apply to attend The presentation is in the Board packet.

Board Member Reports	Student Board Member Marylyn Mata shared a Fine Arts update. She reported that 4th grade students who will attend Grayslake Middle School (GMS) were invited to a special showing of the school play, <i>The Wizard of Oz</i> . She also highlighted recent band activities, including competition performances, and announced that the GMS Jazz Band was invited to perform at the prestigious Jazz Showcase in Chicago, Illinois.
	Student Board Member Elise McKeown shared several updates. She reported that on Sunday, June 1, 8th grade students will participate in the graduation ceremony at Grayslake North High School. Additionally, 52 8th grade students from Grayslake Middle School (GMS) and Park Campus will travel to Washington, D.C. on June 4. Elise also noted that 59 students and 4 staff members will attend the Future Quest field trip at the Lake County Tech Campus. Finally, she gave a special thank you to the Operations and Maintenance (O&M) staff for their work clearing unused items from the band room and building a new long jump pit.
	Student Board Member Augustin Lagunas shared a sports update. He reported that the GMS and Frederick wrestling team advanced to the State tournament. He also noted that the Science Olympiad State tournament will take place this weekend. In bowling, the team competed at sectionals, and one member qualified for the State tournament. Lastly, Augustin shared that 187 students from GMS and Frederick will participate on the track team this season.
