New Math Resources Selected

After a thorough needs assessment was completed with teachers and principals, a need for updated math materials was identified, as our current contracts with EnVision and Carnegie Learning are coming to an end this school year. We are excited to share that at the March 19th Board of Education meeting, two new math resources were approved to begin in the 25-26 school year. Both of these programs will support all learners in the area of math, including our multilingual learners (both are available in Spanish) and our students who receive special education support.

Illustrative Math is a comprehensive K-5 math resource that utilizes a problem-based instructional framework designed to develop students' deep mathematical understanding through active learning. The program connects the why, how, and what of mathematics, creating a coherent progression of mathematical concepts across units and grade levels. Through its multidimensional approach, students engage with digital, print, and interactive materials, including virtual manipulatives. The resource balances three key aspects of mathematical rigor - conceptual understanding, procedural fluency, and real-world application - while providing an entry point for all learners. This structured program helps build student confidence and perseverance, preparing them with enduring mathematical skills and understandings.



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Amplify Desmos Math is a high-quality math resource with a structured approach to problem-based learning that systematically builds on students' curiosity to develop lasting grade-level understanding. Amplify Desmos Math combines and connects conceptual understanding, procedural fluency, and application. Lessons are designed around proficiency progress, which is a model that provides teachers with clear instructional moves to build from students' prior knowledge to grade-level learning. Amplify Desmos Math combines problem-based lessons, intervention, personalized practice, and assessments into a coherent and engaging experience for both students and teachers. Comprehensive student profiles provide full data on students' assets and skills, empowering teachers to provide just-in-time scaffolds throughout core instruction and targeted intervention when needed. Each lesson also includes recommendations for resources to use with students to support, strengthen, and stretch their understanding of the lesson goal.

Our staff will begin to undergo training for both of these resources this spring.


MR. JAMES "JIM" MILLER, 1941-2025



GENERAL MEETING: March 19, 2025

The CCSD 46 Board of Education held a general meeting on Wednesday, March 19, 2025, in the Falcon Room of Frederick School.

President Stephen Mack called the meeting to order at 6:01 pm. Following the Pledge of Allegiance and the approval of the agenda, visitors to the meeting are invited to address the board for the first of two public comment opportunities. No comments were made.

The meeting began with Board President Mack requesting a motion to suspend Robert's Rules of Order in order for Board Members and meeting attendees to participate in a sustainability activity to provide feedback on board policies and their connection to sustainability, finance, and community.















The meeting continued with a presentation by the CCSD 46 food service provider, OrganicLife. Representatives from OrganicLife updated the Board on district-wide improvements, including enhanced signage, expanded menu options, and the introduction of composting. Since beginning their service with the district in August 2024, OrganicLife has reported an increase of 11,000 meals served. They also shared results of a student survey, which indicated that having multiple meal choices was the students' top preference.

Board reports were presented as well as the Superintendent report. During the Board reports, Mrs. Jessica Albert mentioned that she attended an online Illinois Association of School Boards (IASB) webinar which included a robut legislative update. She noted that the Illinois State Board of Education (ISBE) is considering removing the Fine Arts Indicator from the school report card as part of its accountability framework redesign. Mrs. Albert also congratulated the D46 band and choir students advancing to state and recognized the student artwork displayed at the Grayslake Area Public Library.

Dr. Stephen Mack attended the Wizard of Oz performance at Grayslake Middle School and praised the talented young performers. He also participated in the SEDOL Governing Board meeting, where they discussed developing a dashboard on their website to provide more information.

Mrs. Kristy Miller shared that the Community Engagement Committee will host a food drive for the Avon Township Food Pantry from April 21-25, with drop-off locations available at Meadowview, Woodview, and Avon Center Schools. Mrs. Miller also attended the Lake Division dinner meeting, where discussions included Governor Pritzker's funding and a federal update indicating no immediate impact on schools from recent executive orders, though there may be uncertainties regarding Medicaid. Additionally, the Department of Education has been reduced by 50 percent.

Mr. Jim Weidman reminded everyone that BarnFest will take place on Saturday, April 26, at Jesse Oaks Barn.

Dr. Lynn Glickman welcomed Mr. Jose Zires, Director of Operations, Maintenance, and Safety. She announced that the ticket price for BarnFest will increase by \$15 on April 1st, and all ticket purchasers will be entered into a raffle for a \$200 Amazon gift card. Dr. Glickman also mentioned that spring conferences were underway and highlighted several positive events across the district, including band and choir competitions, a musical performance at Park Campus, a spring play at Grayslake Middle School, and the Community Art Fair at the Grayslake Area Public Library. She concluded her update by wishing all families a relaxing and enjoyable spring break.

Mrs. Amanda Pelsor, Director of Innovation, shared that the media center core meeting user groups have been scheduled, and she plans to gather student input in the future.



President Mack then requested a motion for the approval of the Consent Agenda, which includes Minutes from previous meetings, the Personnel Report, Exception Report, Accounts Payable Report, and Treasurer's Report. The motion carried.

New Business, which are new issues for the Board to discuss, included the following:

2025-2026 Preliminary Staffing Plan - Dr. Chris Wolk, Director of Human Resources, presented the
preliminary staffing plan for the 2025-26 school year. The planning process begins in January with meetings
involving building administrators and department heads.

Staffing Plan Overview:

- Pre-K and Kindergarten enrollment numbers will remain the same
- Current grade levels advance sequentially (e.g., 2024-25 Kindergarten becomes 2025-26 1st grade, and so forth)

Enrollment Trends:

Over the past six school years, student enrollment has remained between 3,450 and 3,550

Class Size Parameters (Per Collective Bargaining Agreement):

- Kindergarten 4th Grade: 25 students
- 5th Grade 8th Grade: 30 students
- Projected class sizes for 2025-26:
 - K-4: 17-25 students
 - 5-8: 24-28 students

Staffing Changes for 2025-26:

- Reduction of 4 Classroom Sections: Due to projected enrollment decreases, the district will reduce four classroom sections through attrition (retirements and resignations) without conducting a reduction in force (RIF)
- Increase of Resource Teacher at Woodview School: This addition addresses rising IEP numbers and aligns staffing with other K-4 buildings
- Increase of Support Staff for MILE and LINK Programs:
 - · Add 0.4 FTE Social Worker
 - · Add 0.5 FTE Speech-Language Pathologist
 - These additions create full-time positions (1.0 FTE) to better serve these programs.
 - Increase of 0.5 FTE Social Worker at the Early Childhood Center: This increase addresses the growing needs of Early Childhood students
- The Purchase of Student Chromebooks, Chromecare Warranty, and Cases Ms. Amanda Pelsor, Director of Innovation, shared that the district is committed to maintaining a consistent refresh cycle for both student and staff devices as part of the Master Technology Plan. Last year, the Board approved transitioning to a four-year, predictable refresh cycle for student Chromebooks.

Student Chromebook Refresh Cycle:

- Chromebooks are purchased for two grade levels annually and three grade levels every four years
- Each year, the district will purchase Chromebooks for students in 1st and 5th grades, with an additional refresh for Kindergarten every four years
- Students in these grades receive new devices and will retain them for four years

The upcoming Chromebook purchase from ITsavvy includes:

- 1,000 Lenovo 500e Chromebooks at a total cost of \$339,000
- Management licenses totaling \$31,000
- Protective bundle including a case and four years of ChromeCare Warranty (with \$0 deductible for screen repairs) at a cost of \$95,000

This purchase ensures all new devices are equipped with comprehensive protection and aligns with the district's commitment to providing reliable technology for students.



New Business [continued]

• Wold Fee Proposals for 2026 Media Center Renovations and 2026 Exterior Envelope Improvements Project - In alignment with the district's Educational Adequacy Study, a Media Center Core Planning Group (CPG), led by Wold Architects, was formed to explore opportunities to modernize the district's libraries and media centers. Proceeds from the limiting rate approved in March 2024 will be used to enhance learning environments, including upgrading these media spaces.

In September 2024, the district received an appropriation of \$451,735 from the Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity (DCEO) for capital work. This grant will cover costs associated with brickwork and foundation repairs. Wold Architects has identified \$971,450 in priority work that may be funded using this grant.

At the November 20, 2024, Regular Board meeting, the Board of Education approved the purchase of chillers for Frederick and Prairieview Schools from Daikin Applied for \$536,700. On December 11, 2024, the Board awarded a contract to Premier Mechanical Inc. for \$1,238,000 to purchase and install boilers and install the chillers. Additional site work at Frederick School, including pavement improvements, will be completed alongside the chiller replacement project. This work involves replacing the existing chiller/dumpster area and the adjacent driveway and sidewalk.

The Board of Education reviewed the three fee proposals from Wold detailing the scope and costs for the 2026 media center renovations, exterior envelope improvements, and site improvements at Frederick School.

• Engagement Agreements for Interim Director of Operations and Maintenance with Gewalt Hamilton Associate and Professional Services for the 2025 Construction Projects - Gewalt Hamilton Associates, Inc. (GHA) is an engineering firm with over 40 years of experience serving governmental clients, providing civil engineering services including investigation, design, and construction.

Previous Engagements:

March 20, 2024: The Board of Education approved an Engagement Agreement with GHA for consultancy support through June 30, 2024. June 26, 2024: The administration presented an Engagement Agreement with GHA to provide Interim Director of Operations and Maintenance services. GHA team members Scott Gaunky and Steve Miller led these efforts

As the meeting drew to a close, topics for future agenda items were discussed, and the public once again had an opportunity to address the Board of Education. There was one comment made regarding concerns over the schedule changes at Grayslake Middle School. The Board went into closed session at 7:34 pm.
