REGISTRATION FOR THE 2026-2027 SCHOOL YEAR IS NOW OPEN!

Online Registration for the 2026-2027 school year is now open! CCSD 46 offers a \$25 Early Bird discount for families that complete the online application and submit payment before May 22nd, the last day of school.

Please remember that for registration to be complete for the upcoming school year, the Online Registration application must be submitted with necessary supporting documents, and payment or a payment plan must be received. Schedules and transportation assignments will not be released in August until registration is complete.

Pre-K students must complete the Early Childhood Screening and qualify for one of the early childhood programs *PRIOR* to completing the registration application. For more information regarding the Early Childhood program, please contact the Early Childhood Center at (847) 543-6204.

Returning Family Registration

If a child in your family has currently or previously been enrolled in CCSD 46, you can access registration through your Infinite Campus parent portal. If you do not have an account or have forgotten your password, please contact your child's school.

Online registration is completed as a family. If you are enrolling new students from your family or your student is moving buildings, they are still considered continuing students, and all students in the family are completed through the same application.

5ESSENTIALS SURVEY



Organizing Schools for Improvement

Since February 3, 2026, students in grades 4-8 and teachers across Illinois have had an opportunity to participate in the eleventh annual statewide Illinois 5Essentials Survey. This survey is designed to generate a detailed picture of the inner workings of your child's school. As a parent/guardian, this opportunity will allow you to share your thoughts on the important elements of school effectiveness in a survey about your child's school.

On behalf of the Illinois State Board of Education, the 5Essentials Survey is administered online by [UChicago Impact](#) at the [University of Chicago](#). The survey gathers data related to five indicators that can predict important student outcomes, including improved attendance and larger test score gains. These five indicators that affect and predict school success are:

- Effective Leaders
- Collaborative Teachers
- Involved Families
- Supportive Environments
- Ambitious Instruction

Prior research in more than 400 schools has shown that schools that were strong on at least three of these "5Essential" indicators were 10 times more likely to improve student learning gains in math and reading than those that were weak on three or more Essentials.

If at least 20 percent of parents complete this survey for a school, a parent supplement will be generated. The parent data will be used by the district as a measure of continuous improvement. Your participation in the parent portion of the survey will help us understand the conditions at your child's school and guide improvement. Your identity and survey responses will be kept completely confidential and will never be connected to you or your child. For parents, the Illinois 5Essentials Survey will be available through March 13, 2026. To take the survey please visit <https://survey.5-essentials.org/illinois/> and select the appropriate survey to begin.

Your participation in the parent portion of the survey will help us understand the conditions at your child's school and guide improvement. Your identity and survey responses will be kept completely confidential and will never be connected to you or your child.

For students in Grades 4-8, the Illinois 5Essentials Survey will be administered during school. This survey should take approximately 25 minutes to complete. Please see the additional information regarding the Student Survey for more details.



COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT COMMITTEE: SCHOOL NIGHT OUT EVENTS



STUDENT PRIVACY AND LIFETOUCH

CCSD 46 has received the following statement from our contracted school photography company, Lifetouch.

Public Statement from Ken Murphy, Lifetouch Group CEO, on recent rumors around student privacy.

At Lifetouch, student safety goes beyond the camera lens. As a trusted partner to schools for 90 years, we're committed to protecting the privacy and personal information of every student we serve. When Lifetouch photographers take your student's picture, that image is safeguarded for families and schools, only, with no exceptions. Lifetouch does not – and has never provided – images to any third party.

Amidst a sea of misinformation, here are the facts:

- Lifetouch images are shared only for the purposes of school records and to allow parents or guardians to purchase them. Additionally, as part of our decades long relationship with the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children, Lifetouch prints SmileSafe cards free of charge for each student we photograph that families can use with law enforcement if a child goes missing.
- Lifetouch follows all applicable federal, state, and local data privacy laws, including the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA). In fact, Lifetouch was the first school photography company to sign a voluntary and enforceable privacy pledge—reaffirming our deep commitment to protecting school communities.
- Lifetouch never shares, sells, or licenses student images to train AI models, including large language models, or facial recognition technology. Lifetouch has never provided images for such purposes to any other third party.
- Funds managed by subsidiaries of Apollo Global Management are investors in Shutterfly, the parent company of Lifetouch. Neither Apollo nor its funds are involved in the day-to-day operations of Lifetouch and therefore no one employed by Apollo has ever had access to any student images.
- Lifetouch is not named in the Epstein files. The documents contain no allegations that Lifetouch itself was involved in, or that student photos were used in, any illicit activities.

We value the trust you put in us to safeguard your students' images, and we are proud to help families across the country preserve these milestone memories.

GENERAL MEETING REVIEW

CCSD 46 Board of Education Meeting Review is a brief summary of events and topics of discussion that occur at general board meetings.

GENERAL MEETING: February 11, 2026

The CCSD 46 Board of Education held a general meeting on Wednesday, February 11, 2026, in the Falcon Room in Frederick School.

President Stephen Mack called the meeting to order at 6:00 pm. Following the Pledge of Allegiance and the approval of the agenda, visitors to the meeting are invited to address the board for the first of two public comment opportunities. No comments were made.

The meeting began with a presentation by the Park Campus Leader of the Pack, which is comprised of 7th and 8th-grade students. The students reported on activities and accomplishments from the past year focused on supporting school events, building community, and promoting a positive school climate. Accomplishments included:

- Donut Days
- Holiday parties for grades K–4
- Paw Print orders and school store operations
- Friday Night Out (FNO) events
- Hunger Games mentoring
- Library helpers
- Spirit Days
- School assemblies
- Concessions for after-school events
- Participation in the Avon Food Pantry on February 21



Leader of the Pack students fulfill Paw Print Café orders once a month. Paw Prints are earned when students are recognized for positive behavior or nominated as Student of the Week. Students select prizes, which are prepared and delivered to classrooms by Leader of the Pack students. Park Campus students also participated in activities promoting inclusion and respect for all students. Each grade level engaged in reading a children's book and completing related activities as part of the school's "No Place for Hate" efforts.

Board reports were then presented, as well as the Superintendent's report.

Park Campus Student Representative Ella Nelson reported that staff and students across grade levels have been actively engaged in meaningful learning experiences. Students in grades K-4 participated in World Reading Day activities, including virtual author visits and cross-curricular projects such as a fourth-grade economics store. Students also engaged in "No Place for Hate" lessons and discussions to promote inclusivity and understanding.

Student Representative Bennett Peck shared that grades 5-8 continued academic work across content areas, including literary analysis, climate models in science, real-world math applications, research writing, and a turtle egg incubation project. Seventh graders completed a Mars research paper, and eighth graders finalized Holocaust projects, highlighted by a guest speaker who shared her personal experience.



Board members each provided a summary of the sessions they attended at the Illinois Association of School Boards (IASB) Conference in November. Members reported that the sessions were informative and provided valuable insights to support their governance work. Dr. Stephen Mack served as the district's Delegate and attended the Delegate Assembly, where representatives from school districts across Illinois voted on proposed resolutions.

Mrs. Kristy Braden shared a legislative update on state funding for schools and categorical mandates. The proposed legislation aims to achieve fully funded schools by 2027.

Mrs. Kristy Miller attended the Village of Grayslake hearing regarding proposed community planning initiatives

Dr. Stephen Mack offered condolences on behalf of the District for the passing of former CCSD 46 student Jonathan Williams.

During the Superintendent's Report, Dr. Lynn Glickman, Superintendent, shared that the administration met with Wold Architects and Engineers to begin planning summer 2027 construction for the remaining three media centers.

Mrs. Amy Gluck shared that District 46 was selected to participate in the National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP), known as "The Nation's Report Card." This congressionally mandated project assesses 4th, 8th, and 12th-grade student knowledge in subjects such as math, reading, and science. NAEP provides a consistent, national benchmark of student achievement across states but does not produce individual scores or affect student grades. This year, 45 8th-grade students from Grayslake Middle School were chosen to participate.



Mrs. Gluck also noted that there will be no school on Friday, February 13, as staff will participate in a Lake County Institute Day hosted by the Lake County Regional Office of Education. Three schools in the county will host the event, which includes keynote speakers and breakout sessions, and 17 District 46 staff members will serve as presenters.

President Mack then requested a motion for the approval of the Consent Agenda, which includes Minutes from previous meetings, the Personnel Report, Exception Report, and the Accounts Payable Report. The motion carried.

Action Items voted on by the Board for this meeting included:

- Motion to approve the Proposed 2026-27 School Calendar, waiving legal holidays as required under Public Act 096-0640: Veterans Day (November 11), President Lincoln's Birthday (February 12), and Casimir Pulaski's Birthday (March 2) in order to hold school
Approved 7-0
- Motion to approve the Contract Award for 3 Rooftop Units (RTUs) at Prairieview with PremiStar
Approved 7-0
- Motion to approve Press Plus Policies 120 and remove Policy 2:150 for further consideration
Approved 7-0

Unfinished Business, which are unresolved issues that were previously brought before the Board to be discussed further included:

- **Policy Committee Feedback**

Mrs. Miller shared feedback from the check-in question discussed at the January 28 Policy Committee meeting. The Committee affirmed that PRESS provides valued fidelity and expertise to the District. Members agreed that policies should be followed as written to ensure legal compliance. The Policy Committee will consider minor wording revisions when appropriate.

New Business, which are new issues for the Board to discuss, included the following:

- Scale Server Environment Purchase**

Ms. Amanda Pelsor, Director of Innovations, shared that the District's current server environment is centralized in one building and is scheduled for refresh within the next one to two years. Ongoing upgrades to security cameras, access control, and intercom systems require additional server capacity. The approved intercom project included approximately \$30,000 for building-level servers due to capacity limitations. Continuing this approach would result in multiple single-purpose servers while still requiring a full system refresh. Administration worked with the District's Managed Service Provider, Forward Edge, to develop a solution that meets both short and long-term needs. The proposed Scale Computing solution consists of three interconnected server nodes located at different sites across the District that operate as a shared pool of resources. This design eliminates system-specific servers and provides district-wide redundancy, reducing single points of failure and improving system reliability. The proposed solution consolidates planned expenditures into a single strategic investment, reduces ongoing maintenance and monitoring demands, and improves the District's security posture. The three-node hybrid scale cluster, including installation, totals \$82,386. This replaces approximately \$30,000 in server costs from the approved intercom project, resulting in a net additional cost of \$52,386.

- Grayslake Planning Supplemental Discussion**

The Board discussed the recent Village of Grayslake planning meeting regarding the possibility of future residential development. Board members expressed concerns related to financial incentives for new development, the potential impact on schools, and the limited emphasis on schools in Village communications. It was suggested that the District consider establishing a formal governance mechanism to support ongoing collaboration and communication.

As the meeting drew to a close, topics for future agenda items were discussed, and the public once again had an opportunity to address the Board of Education. No public comments were made. The Board adjourned the general meeting at 7:26 pm and entered into closed session.
